DOCTOR SIMON-PRESIDENT OF NEW CANADIAN COMPANY....

An agreement has been reached between Evode Ltd. and Electric Reduction Company of Canada Ltd., the largest overseas subsidiary company of Albright & Wilson Ltd., whereby a new Canadian company will be formed jointly to manufacture and market the Evode range of Adhesives in Canada and the U.S.A.

The new company, Ercona Adhesives Ltd., will be owned 60% by ERCO and 40% by Evode. Dr. H. Simon has been elected President and Mr. E. R. Kinsley, President of ERCO, is the Chairman. The other directors are Mr. W. E. K. Piercy (Albright & Wilson), Mr. E. H. Beaumont (Evode) and Mr. L. G. Lillico (ERCO).

A factory will shortly be established in the Toronto area and is expected to go into production towards the end of this year or early in 1966. It is planned to produce a range of adhesives and mastics to serve the building and construction industries as well as industrial manufacturers in the furniture, footwear and automotive fields.

Although our products are well known in all parts of the world we have not previously had production facilities in Canada. This agreement with Albright & Wilson will provide both organisations with a useful basis for A striking new portrait of Dr. H. ... CULMINATION OF WORLD TOUR

The Canadian deal is a personal success for Dr. Simon and was completed on the last stop of his recent strenuous world tour when he visited Evode Licensees and interests in ten countries covering 37,000 miles in 45 days

First stop on the tour was Tehran in Iran, where a meeting was held with our agents, the Arick Trading Company. The full range of Evo-stik Adhesives was discussed. After only two hours rest Dr. Simon emplaned at 3.30 a.m. on the 4th February for New Delhi, India, arriving at 9 a.m. Indian time. He was met by Mr. S. N. P. Punj of Punj Sons Private Ltd. (who will number amongst our manufacturing licensees as soon as agreement has been finalised). Whilst in Dehli, Dr. Simon held talks with officials of the Indian Government and was successful in obtaining approval for the transfer of Royalty payments from India.

In addition to touring the Puni factories in Delhi and Calcutta the doctor was able to visit the Taj Mahal, one of the seven wonders of the world.

EVODE ROOF TREATMENT O.K. FOR TROPICS

From Calcutta to Bangkok in Thailand and the offices of our agents, Loxley Ltd. Discussions were held with Mr. Thomas, Loxley's Manager and a tour of inspection was made of several roofs which had been waterproofed by the Evode System. Upon one of the roofs, that of the State Lottery Building, a temperature of 90° in the shade was recorded. The Doctor reports that in all cases our roof treatment was standing up remarkably well to tropical conditions

In the two days he was in Bangkok, there was little time for sightseeing, but he did see one of Thailand's many beautiful Temples and visited Bangkok's famous floating market—"a blaze of colour."









Report from Portugal

FACE LIFT FOR ESTORIL



The magnificent new hotel Estoril-Sol is Portugal's largest hotel and rivals the Lisbon Ritz* as the country's most luxurious. Most of its rooms face the Bay of Cascais whilst others overlook the Olympic-size swimming pool and 14 acre park. The hotel is the 'brain child' of millionaire Senhor Teodoro dos Santos who in the face of bitter opposition and a series of lawsuits which delayed building for five years, was awarded a 25 year concession to build and operate a new Casino at Estoril. Eventually work was started on the Casino and the building of a £2 million hotel. 500,000 tons of earth and rock were shifted for this 400 room, 22 storey edifice. Agents for our Building Chemicals Division in Portugal, Tito Pereira de Sousa were successful in having Mellitol specified for this building. One of the more unusual places were Mellitol was incorporated was in the concrete wine tanks. The olympic-size swimming pool also incorporates Mellitol. Room prices for this lavish hotel are surprisingly low and range from less than £2 daily in the high season (26/–d November to March) to 94/–d for a double room. Meals cost an additional 31/–d daily.




One of the beautiful temples in Bangkok visited by Dr. Simon. (Photograph by Dr. Simon)

out a place to sleep. After some difficulty alternative accommodation was secured, but this meant that all postal arrangements previously made, went haywire. Business trips were also made to Wellington and Auck-land during his six day stay. Apart from a sightseeing trip on a Sunday, there was not as much time as he would have liked to see the natural beauty of the country. The weather, he said, was very like England in early September with plenty of rain. The people of New Zealand radiated a great feeling of independence (although, he added with a wry smile, there was perhaps a slightly Victorian atmosphere which emanated from the local architectural styles.)

From San Francisco he flew to New York where he had discussions with Wilco Machine Works, Inc., to whom we supply Evo-stik Hot Melt Adhesives. His impression was that the market is growing in the U.S.A. The Americans scored, not so much in the quality of their materials but in the automated methods of application. "This" he said, "emphasised in my mind the desirability of having manufacturing arrangements on the spot.

From New York he flew to Toronto and into a heavy snow storm. Fortunately his plane was Turbo-Prop Jet and was allowed to land. Had he chosen to fly by pure Jet, his plane would have been diverted to Montreal and he would have lost considerable time

On the first day from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. and the second day from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. discussions regarding the formation of Ercona Adhesives Ltd. continued with-out interruption. After 7 p.m. Dr. Simon departed from Toronto to Montreal where he emplaned on a flight to Glasgow and finally to Manchester arriving home in Stafford at 10.30 p.m.

- The Grant of Club Membership shall require not less than 25 years continuous service (prior to normal pension date) with the Evode Group ... excepting that in the case those who joined the Group by reason of the takeover of Vik Supplies Ltd. in 1957, continuous previous service with the Lotus Organisation (of which Vik Supplies Ltd. then formed part), shall, subject to Clause 1, qualify as Group Service.
- 3 "Continuous service" shall mean service uninterrupted other than by war-time contingency or National Service with H.M. Forces, and any severance of employment (not withstanding subsequent re-engagement) shall render ineligible all service prior to the severance.
- Club Membership shall cease on termination of employment for any reason other than retirement, retirement being at normal pension date or at such alternative date as approved by the E.G.C.
- 5. All applications for Club Membership must be directed by the applicant to the Personnel Officer of the Evode Group of Companies for submission to the Committee of the Club decision shall be final, and about which the applicant will be notified.
